Fund description

The fund pursues total return by investing in a broad mix of bond sectors that management believes will benefit from changes in economic and market conditions. U.S. government and investment-grade corporate bonds predominate, with limits on exposure to domestic high-yield and both developed and emerging international sectors.

Core Plus, Intermediate Bond Fund

- Invests primarily in U.S. government, mortgagebacked and investment-grade corporate fixed income with modest exposure to sectors such as high yield and emerging markets debt
- May invest in below investment-grade securities up to 25%



Highlights

- R6 shares returned 6.72% in the quarter, compared to 6.82% for the Bloomberg US Aggregate Bond Index (BAB)
- Small allocations to the out-of-index high yield, emerging markets (EM) and trade finance loan sectors added to returns, as did an overweight to mortgage-backed securities (MBS)
- The fund was positioned for shorter maturities to outperform longer maturities (a yield curve steepener), which added to returns
- An underweight to investment-grade (IG) corporate bonds detracted from returns
- Less interest-rate sensitivity than the BAB detracted from returns

Looking back

Interest rates declined precipitously in the fourth quarter, with 2-year Treasury yields falling from 5.04% to 4.25% and 10-year Treasury yields falling from 4.57% to 3.88%.

Significantly lower interest rates, combined with tighter credit spreads, powered November and December to the best two-month span for the bond market since 1982. The big drop in rates in the fourth quarter offset the big increase in rates earlier in the year.

The fourth quarter retracement lower in rates was due primarily to two factors. First, fears that the November Treasury refunding announcement would include a deluge of long-term bond issuance proved unfounded as the Treasury Department chose instead to increase issuance of shorter maturities to fund the growing federal deficit. More importantly, the Federal Reserve (Fed) shocked the markets by pivoting from a focus on fighting inflation risks to fighting recession risks.

All sectors of the taxable bond market outperformed Treasuries during the fourth quarter. In general, lower credit quality sectors outperformed higher credit quality sectors.

Performance

Federated Hermes Total Return Bond Fund R6 shares posted a total return net of fees of 6.72% for the quarter. The performance compares to a return of 6.82% for the BAB. The fund's total return for the period also reflected actual cash flows, transaction costs and other expenses that were not reflected in the total return of the BAB.

How we are positioned

As we start the first quarter of 2024, the fund remains conservatively positioned in terms of sector allocation given rich credit spreads and concerns that the markets may be overestimating the probability of a soft landing for the economy. The vast majority of the fund is invested in high-quality securities. The fund is 63% invested in government guaranteed Treasuries and MBS, and 23% in high-quality corporate bonds. The fund has only 2.6% in high-yield bonds, 3.8% in EM bonds (up from 2% at the prior quarter end), less than 1% each in CMBS and ABS, and nothing in bank loans. The fund retains a 4.2% allocation to trade finance loans, which returned over 9% in 2023.


The fund's overall duration was identical to the BAB at year end. The fund is overweight the 2- and 5-year maturity buckets and underweight the 10- and 30-year maturity buckets.

In terms of security selection, the fund added a 5% position in Treasury Inflation-Protected Securities (TIPS) in December. With the Fed pivoting to less-aggressive monetary policy in 2024, real rates should decline. Additionally, if inflation remains stuck above the Fed's 2% target at the same time the Fed has stopped tightening policy, TIPS should outperform nominal Treasuries.

The fund had little non-dollar exposure to start the new year.

The fund employed derivatives to hedge risk and to express duration, yield curve and currency investment themes during the quarter. Derivatives are used when they are less expensive or more efficient than physical securities to express investment themes from Federated Hermes' Alpha Pod process. Historical sector weightings (%)







1The ratings referred to in the quality breakdown are provided by Standard and Poor's, Moody's, and Fitch. The allocation of ratings presented aligns with the methodology of the Bloomberg index. Bloomberg employs the middle rating from Standard and Poor's, Moody's, and Fitch to determine a security's credit classification, essentially following a "two-out-of-three" rule. In cases where only two agencies rate a security, the more conservative (lower) rating is utilized. If only one agency rates a security, that single rating is used. Additionally, certain securities may not have a credit rating from any of the agencies, and they are categorized as "not rated." For clarity, credit ratings of A or better are indicative of high credit quality, while BBB represents good credit quality and the lowest tier of investment grade. Ratings of BB and below are assigned to lower-rated securities, often referred to as "junk bonds," and credit ratings of CCC or below indicate a high level of default risk. This breakdown doesn't consider the impact of credit derivatives in the fund.

30-day yield (also known as "SEC yield") for A Shares is a compounded and annualized figure calculated according to a formula set by the SEC. The formula requires use of a specific methodology for calculating dividends and interest earned, and expenses accrued, during the period, and reflects the maximum offering price per fund share. The standardized computation is designed to facilitate yield comparisons among different funds. In the absence of temporary expense waivers or reimbursements, the 30-day yield would have been 3.67% at maximum offering price for A Shares, 4.40% for R6 Shares, and 4.35% for Institutional Shares.

The fund's R6 Shares commenced operations on April 17, 2015. For the period prior to the commencement of operations of the R6 Shares, the performance information shown is for the fund's Institutional Shares, adjusted to reflect the expenses of the R6 Shares for each year for which the expenses of the R6 Shares would have exceeded the actual expenses paid by the Institutional Shares.

A word about risk

Mutual funds are subject to risks and fluctuate in value.

High-yield, lower-rated securities generally entail greater market, credit/default and liquidity risks, and may be more volatile than investment-grade securities.

Bond prices are sensitive to changes in interest rates, and a rise in interest rates can cause a decline in their prices.

The value of some mortgage-backed securities may be particularly sensitive to changes in prevailing interest rates, and although the securities are generally supported by some form of government or private insurance, there is no assurance that private guarantors or insurers will meet their obligations.

Definitions

Alpha shows how much or how little return is generated, given the risk a portfolio takes. A portfolio with an alpha greater than 0 has earned more than expected given its beta—meaning the portfolio has generated excess return without increasing risk. A portfolio with a negative alpha is producing a lower return than would be expected given its risk.

Beta measures a portfolio's volatility relative to the market. A beta greater than 1.00 suggests the portfolio has historically been more volatile than the market as measured by the fund's benchmark. A beta less than 1.00 suggests the portfolio has historically had less volatility relative to the market.

Sharpe ratio is calculated by dividing a fund's annualized excess return by the fund's annualized standard deviation. The higher the Sharpe ratio, the better the fund's historical risk adjusted performance.

Standard deviation is a historical measure of the variability of returns relative to the average annual return. A higher number indicates higher overall volatility.

Up capture ratio/down capture ratio is a measure of how well a manager was able to replicate or improve on periods of positive benchmark returns and how badly the manager was affected by periods of negative benchmark returns. The up-market capture ratio is a measure of a manager's performance in up markets relative to the index during the same period. For example, a ratio value of 115 indicates that the manager has outperformed the market index by 15% in periods when the index has risen. The down-market capture ratio is the direct opposite of the up-market capture ratio, gauging performance of the manager relative to the index in down markets. A ratio value of 80 would indicate the manager had declined on 80% as much as the declining overall market, indicating relative outperformance.

Weighted average bond price is the weighted average of all individual bond prices within a portfolio.

Weighted average coupon is the weighted average interest payment of all individual debt securities within a portfolio.

Weighted average effective duration (sometimes called "Option-Adjusted Duration") is a measure of a security's price sensitivity to changes in interest rates calculated using a model that recognizes that the probability of a bond being called or remaining outstanding until maturity may vary if market interest rates change, and that makes adjustments based on a bond's embedded options (e.g., call rights, or in the case of a mortgage-backed security, the probability that homeowners will prepay their mortgages), if any, based on the probability that the

options will be exercised. A fund's weighted average effective duration will equal the market value weighted average of each bond's effective duration in the fund's portfolio. As with any model, several assumptions are made so the weighted average effective duration of a fund in the Federated Hermes family of funds may not be comparable to other funds outside of the Federated Hermes family of funds. Securities with longer durations are more sensitive to changes in interest rates than securities of shorter durations.

Weighted average effective maturity is the average time to maturity of debt securities held in the fund.

Weighted average yield to maturity is used to determine the rate of return an investor would receive if a long-term, interest-bearing investment, such as a bond, is held to its maturity date. It takes into account purchase price, redemption value, time to maturity, coupon yield and the time between interest payments.

Bloomberg US Aggregate Bond Index is an unmanaged index composed of securities from the Bloomberg Government/Corporate Bond Index, the Mortgage-Backed Securities Index and the Asset-Backed Securities Index. Total return comprises price appreciation/depreciation and income as a percentage of the original investment. Indices are rebalanced monthly by market capitalization.

Bloomberg US Universal Index represents the union of the US Aggregate Index, US Corporate High-Yield, Investment Grade 144A Index, Eurodollar Index, US Emerging Markets Index and the non-ERISA eligible portion of the CMBS Index. The index covers USD denominated, taxable bonds that are rated either investment grade or below investment grade.

Russell Top 200® Index measures the performance of the largest cap segment of the U.S. equity universe. The Russell Top 200® Index is a subset of the Russell 3000® Index. It includes approximately 200 of the largest securities based on a combination of their market cap and current index membership and represents approximately 68% of the U.S. market. The Russell Top 200® Index is constructed to provide a comprehensive and unbiased barometer for this very large cap segment and is completely reconstituted annually to ensure new and growing equities are reflected.
